6. Principal's Report - presented by Stephen Watt

Copy of report attached to these minutes.

Steve Madson, Farm Manager spoke to the P&C advising that existing students would be transitioning from the old training package to the new training package aligning with teach out requirements. Some students will therefore be obtaining credits for recognition of units of competency that have previously been completed under the old training package. Any questions, please speak with Steve. Steve also advised that the working with the Agricultural Advisory Committee, the school was looking into purchasing a merino sheep flock, this being a point of difference between what WACOA Narrogin offers compared to other agricultural colleges. Purchasing a flock would mean taking advantage of genetics that have been gained over many years. The wool market is currently gaining good returns.

7. General Business

a) Loss of 20% of funds from the Agricultural Education Provisions Trust Fund, from 2019. This will have an impact on the school budgeting. Steve informed the P&C that currently 40% of farm revenue goes into the Trust account. The Combined Agricultural Advisory Committee (CAAC) distributes money back to the schools for purchase of farm machinery and the like. Currently, the CWA have released a media statement intending to hold a rally protesting cuts to rural education. Discussion followed and decision was made for P&C to send an invitation to Minister for Education, Sue Ellery inviting her to attend the school and explain how the proposed cut would impact on our school. Simone to draft a letter.



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b) School Ball Parent Dinner- Friday 13th April 2018. Earlier this year to get the event out of the way. Sandra Wheatley volunteered to take on organising the parent dinner at The Esplanade, Fremantle. Hoping to get a similar deal to last year.

- c) **Priorities List-** Next meeting allocate P&C funds as required. We will have a better idea of exactly how much money we have.
- d) Student Activities- It was suggested that parents are informed in advance of planned weekend residence activities to encourage students to attend. Staff do put a lot of time and effort into planning of these activities. Having notice in advance in the Chronicle will enable better planning for families. In addition to residence activities, students have the opportunity to put themselves forward and participate in cattle/sheep teams.
- e) **Teleconference for future P&C meetings.** This may enable more parent participation in meetings given the diverse range of places that we all hail from.
- f) **Constitution, Association rules** Does our constitution require to be updated? Does WACSSO have a template? Liz Leusciatti volunteered to look into this.
- g) **Defensive driver training.** Discussed that we paid money to the school in 2017 and the training was not carried out for 2017 year 11 students. This will be used for 2018 Year 12 students.
- h) **Clothes lines** Question of clothes lines being in closer vicinity of dorms for students to hang clothes rather than excessive use of clothes dryers. Steve said that he believes there are some clotheslines to be attached to walls yet to be put up. He will investigate further.

Machinery Trust allocations \$94,000 for a telehandler, \$50,000 for a dual cab light truck to purchase Recent purchase of 670 merino ewe lambs of superior breeding to undertake major overhaul of our merino sheep enterprise. Selling equivalent number of existing ewes. Ultimate aim of circa 1100 merino ewes self-replacing flock.

Reintroducing training cattle for shows- led steer as well as trade cattle competitions Machinery/hay shed and extension to farm workshop ideally proceed this term Shearer and wool handling training this term- AWI and college funding

Trades theory support on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon for those students behind in their theory Trades advisory group needs progressing

Continuing work to improve focus on competency signoff, use of workshops and enhanced student projects

Infrastructure

Planning for glasshouse for class trials etc

Consultants engaged 2017 to develop refurbishment plan for kitchen- major works required, report complete and seeking support from Central Office for funds. Estimated approx. \$400,000 unlikely to achieve. New report commissioned to look at food safety issues.

Conversion of Shugg dorm to develop new learning spaces- architects have been engaged to design and cost the conversion given the work requires a building permit.

Bottom oval renovation-reseeding to kikuyu when weather cools. Reticulation will be via a travelling irrigator rather than pop-ups.

Various sheds need progressing- chemical, gardeners, machinery, farm workshop extension

Lots of afterhours activities- Trades workshop open Tuesday and Wednesday, computers and staff available every prep, Class staff available after school Tuesday to assist, motorbikes after school Tues and Thurs. Guitar lessons Thursday evening
