On behalf of the students, I would like to thank Mr Wray and the Admin staff for the time spent arranging this year's Country Week event. Unfortunately, I will not be able to accompany the teams this time but hope to be able to make a trip to Perth on one of the days to support the students. I wish our teams all the best for a great week away and would like to thank the staff who have volunteered time after school to train the teams, as well as those staff who are supervising in Perth and Fremantle. Next week, Mr Wray and I will be meeting with all students attending, to go over arrangements and behaviour expectations. During my time as principal at the College, we have had no incidents requiring us to send students home due to poor choices. I hope we can keep this clear record with the 2023 teams.

The College is reporting a number of absences at present, although most of these seem to be related to illness. We are required to request a doctor's certificate for a medical absence exceeding 2 days in a row and where the total medical absences will exceed 5 days

per year. Please remember that notification of any absence for the day program needs to go to the main College email address;

The following absences will be recorded as unauthorised:

Our policy clearly states that mobile phones are to be left in dorms or handed to the front office before school. It appears there is a developing trend of using personal data to bypass the College Wi-Fi to gain access to blocked games and websites during class time. #### **Construction - Mark Batt**



Over the past few weeks, the Year 12 Construction cohort has been planning and designing a chicken coop for the St Mathews Primary School in Narrogin. The St Mathews P&C approached the College with a brief to build a raised chicken coop

with external access to collect the eggs and a fenced free-range area.

The class travelled into the primary school to gather the measurements on site, observe the area the chicken coop is to be built on, and to see if there where any safety issues to consider. We then returned to the College and the class was split into groups. Each group came up with a design and a plan, and the best design was chosen.



This week we started the construction process making the stud walls of the chicken coop. The skills and knowledge the students are using will go towards the CPCCCA2002-Use carpentry tools and equipment unit of competency.

Once the students have built all side walls, floor, roof and stand we will take all components into St Mathews Primary and assemble the coop on site. This will also go towards CPCCM2004-Handle construction materials, CPCCOM1013-Plan and organise work, CPCCVE1011-Undertake a basic construction project and CPCCWHS2001-Apply WHS requirements, policies, and procedures in the construction industry.

The year 12 Construction class will keep the Chronicle community updated, it is great to see the students participating in a community lead project.





#### **Engineering - John Parker**



The semester draws to a close for our Year 10 Engineering groups as they complete set projects and projects of their own design.

We have been utilising the Engineering workshop to assemble horse stalls for the farm. This program was initiated in 2022 where Year 10 students have built sections of the stalls, and this year's

Year 10s are performing the final assembly in readiness for installation. This has been a valuable lesson, not only in steel fabrication but in how pre-fabrication can save time and resources.

Year 11 students are currently working on their major design projects. There are quite a variety of designs this year, ranging from work benches, ute trays, dog kennels, and trailers. The Engineering workshop is very busy and all space is utilised as we have around thirty four projects on the go for the Year 11 groups.

#### **Sheep Commercial**

Shearing was all completed and wool has been sold. The highest price we received was 1830 cents per kilo for a single bale of weaner wool of 16.1 micron, the main line averaged just under 1500 cents with the micron averaging just over 19 micron.

Since our discovery of OJD in some

older ewes early in the year, we have sold our merino weather hoggets and the white tag ewes. Unfortunately the sheep sale prices have declined, so the price we would have hoped for was not met.

Lambing of the remaining merinos commences mid-July and the ewes have been pregnancy scanned and vaccinated ready to put into their lambing mobs.

#### **Sheep Stud**

The stud sheep are lambing at the moment. At one stage, Mr Batt had a 200% rate with some triplets being born, its all looking on track to be well over 100%.

Mr Batt and the students have started selecting Ewes, Lambs and Rams for the upcoming showing season.

#### Cattle

Cattle have just about completed calving and we currently have 60 angus calves on the ground.

Mr Hough has planned an earlier mating for 2023 with some Al planned for some of the cows.

#### **Poultry**

We put our price up to \$5 per dozen recently to assist with the ever-growing cost of production.

We have some College farm raised replacement hens about to go into the main commercial laying area. We are looking forward to seeing how they go compared to the traditional purchased point-of-lay hens.

#### Horticulture

Mr Bertuola is creating new garden beds for the planting of winter crop vegetables to support the kitchen.

#### Workshop

Lately, Mr Tom Foster has been supporting us with vehicle repairs. We have replaced two clutches in utes with another small truck clutch next in line.

#### **Fencing**

Some fencing in our 'white dam' paddock is being renewed in preparation for this to become a cattle paddock (the white dam paddock is on the left as you start driving down our entrance road).

#### Cropping

Wow! Just to start, a huge shoutout to Mr Matt Hough, Mr Wiese, Mr Gooley, Mr Zielke and all of the staff who did little extra bits, as well as all the student drivers that did extra after hours that kept the wheels turning. Great job by all!!

The crops are all in and growing. It got a bit dry there for a while, only a few small patches required re-seeding where we assume the drive clutch on the old combine did not work (we replaced this mid-way through seeding).

We seeded 202ha of Trophy canola, 90ha of Maximus barley, 205ha of Bannister oats, and 65ha of Jurien Lupins. In our canola, we have been treating patches of slugs that are quite capable of destroying whole plants in a very short time. To date, they would have munched their way through about 2 to 3 ha.

Students undertaking their Certificate III Cropping paddocks and have done a great job and all their crops are doing very well.

Mr Hough is currently doing weed controls in crops and Mr Wiese will commence spreading 100kg to the ha of urea on crops starting Monday.

#### **Grain sales**

450 tonne of last year's oats that we had had on hand in our silos has been sold to Unigrain and about 30% has been delivered this week the balance will be delivered to Wagin next week by road train.

#### **Farm Improvements**

Chemical shed construction is done and now the sea containers have been put in place in the shed.

Recently we have received our 2 new 110hp tractors to replace the ageing John Deere 3140 and Ford 7840.

To get these new tractors we went through a government tender process that looks at value for money, availability, price and backup service. The process was very competitive and required a panel of people to determine the successful supplier.

This year, Perkins Machinery from Narrogin was successful and we would like to thank them for their recent delivery of these shiny new blue tractors for our students to operate. These T5 New Holland tractors should serve us well for many years to come.


#### **Student Training and assessments**
