Irwin Barracks Visit - Mitchell Wray

On Thursday, 21st of September, a group of Year 11 students had the opportunity to visit the Irwin Barracks. The purpose of the visit was to provide the students with firsthand insight into the various career opportunities available within the Australian Defence Force (ADF) and to foster an understanding of the importance of defence forces in maintaining national security.

Upon arrival, the students received a warm welcome from the base personnel and were introduced to their designated tour guides. The tour guides, who were experienced ADF Army personnel, provided a brief overview of the base's history its role within the Australian Defence Force and the importance of the Army in the larger defence strategy of the nation.

Comprehensive sessions outlining the diverse career pathways available within the Army where delivered around the Barracks site. The sessions covered officer and enlisted roles specialised trades and the various educational and training opportunities provided by the ADF.

The students were also provided with information on the benefits and lifestyle offerings of joining the Australian Defence Force, including competitive salaries, healthcare provisions, adventure training, travel and support for further education.

The students had the opportunity to visit the training areas where they participated in set activities, underwent physical fitness drills, viewed weapon simulations and tactical exercises. This allowed them to witness firsthand, the rigorous training requirements of ADF personnel.

Display areas were organised to showcase a range of military equipment, including armoured vehicles, field artillery and communication systems. Students were encouraged to ask questions and gain insights into the modern technology employed by the Army.

The student visit to Irwin Barracks proved to be highly informative and engaging, offering the students a comprehensive understanding of the various career opportunities within the Australian Defence Force.

The experience at Irwin Barracks will undoubtedly inspire the students to consider a career in the Australian Defence Force.

Year 12 General Animal Production Systems - Leanne Sjollema





In week 8, the Year 12 General Animal Production Systems students were designing and establishing a scientific investigation to determine which chemical is more effective at repelling flies, and thus reducing the risk of flystrike. They tested a range of products including commercially available synthetic chemicals as well as some naturally derived products to determine their success rate. Later on, they created a scientific report to analyse their findings and develop their understanding of what factors make scientific data reliable. This enabled them to determine reliability of published data as they move into positions which may require them to make decisions based on data.







East Metropolitan Health Service Youth Innovation Think Tank 2023









Early in Term 1, all students were invited to be involved in the EMHS Youth Innovation Think Tank challenge in 2023, where they had the opportunity to ideate novel solutions to a problem faced by the health system. Using Human-Centred Designing Thinking, student teams worked with a clinical mentor to understand real world health problems, before pitching their idea for real world implementation. Eleven students from Year 11 and 12 registered their interest, and in Term 2 they were advised of the problem: Eliminate Vaping in Adolescents.

Students spent time researching developing a desirable, feasible and viable solution. During Term 3 they travelled to Northam Senior High School to pitch their solution in front of a panel of judges from the health service executive, with the winning team competing in the finals in Perth for the most innovative idea. Whilst we did not proceed to the finals, our students were commended for their enthusiasm engagement - they were also told that they were all welcome to employment with the Health Service as they demonstrated integrity required for the future of our country.



TAYLER KENT 2006 - 2007


Tayler attended Western Australian College of Agriculture Narrogin in 2006 and 2007, where she studied Agriculture and Equine. There was a small group of four students in her equine cohort for that year level. She loved the animal production and nutrition classes, but . After a few years of travel, she decided to enrol in Animal Science at Murdoch University.

Her planned path to study to become a vet changed direction in her second year, where she discovered a passion for biochemistry and medical research. Tayler transferred into a double degree studying Biomedical Science, Molecular Biology and Forensic Biology, where her love of pharmacology (drugs) and toxicology (poisons) has led her into a career as a **Research Scientist**. After completing her Honours degree, Tayler embarked on a PhD in Reproductive Pharmacology,

researching the biochemical changes that occur in there productive system in response to common dietary supplements (which are very popular but can be very unsafe!). She has not forgotten her roots, though, she uses Merino rams as a research model to investigate the changes induced by these supplements!

Tayler is now employed as a lecturer in pharmacology at Murdoch, where she is able to pass on her passion for drug science and toxicology, as well as continuing her research into herbal medicine and supplement toxicity and reproductive biology.

Year 12s Will, Bryce, Justin and Alex cooked enchiladas. Great team work and turned out an amazing meal!






Year 12s Kiera, Jayden, Samuel, Cody and Hayden cooked their all-time favourite, chicken parmi with chips and salad.






