The College is located eight kilometres west of Narrogin, Western Australia on a 1350 hectare farm. Operating since 1906, we are the oldest residential agricultural college in the state and have a long and proud tradition of educating young people for careers in rural and related industries.

The College is a day and boarding school that offers specialist secondary education for Years 10, 11 and 12 students in a supportive rural community. We are a small school with around 160 students which allows staff to develop close working relationships with each student.

Students graduate with a range of qualifications that enable them to gain apprenticeships, employment and further training/education. The recognition of our students at a state level in a variety of different areas is ongoing evidence of our successful programs. The College consistently ranks in the top public schools in Western Australia. Our experienced staff strive to assist each student in reaching their potential.

Application Process

Entry to the WA College of Agriculture Narrogin is by application and a selection process is carried out to identify those students whose interests and aspirations will benefit from enrolment at the college, and whose behaviour and application is consistent with college expectations.

When applying to enrol at the WA College of Agriculture Narrogin, prospective students complete the Application Form which is enclosed with this package and can also be found on our website.

Do not hesitate to contact the College Enrolment Officer, if you need assistance or further information.

The Application Process :

- Application Form completed and returned to the College with the following:
 - Birth certificate or extract
 - Most recent school report
 - A character reference (not from a relative)
 - Four passport photos
 - Year 9 NAPLAN results, when available
 - ° OLNA (Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment) results, when available
- Once the College receives the Application Form, the Enrolment Officer will contact you to arrange an interview date at the College.
- Personalised student interviews are held with either the Principal, Deputy Principal or Residential Manager.
- Once accepted, an enrolment package will be sent for completion. A deposit of \$200.00 is payable upon acceptance of an offer at the College and credited against First Term Fees. The Acceptance Deposit is fully refunded in the event of a written withdrawal being received prior to the start of Term One.
- At the end of the year, more information will be sent regarding uniforms, student requirements, booklist and course selection (Year 11 & 12 only as the Year 10 course is generic).



Prospective Student Selection

The selection process aims to identify:

Students whose aspirations, skills and interests can be enhanced by the college.

Students who have demonstrated behaviour and attitude suitable to the residential and learning environment.

Selection Criteria

- 1. Interest in the agriculture curriculum and related trades.
- 2. Positive and safe behaviour in learning environments
- 3. Attitude and effort (as per school report)
- 4. Attendance exempting reasonable explanation
- 5. Reason for applying to the college
- 6. Residential capability

The College provides a range of educational options enabling students to graduate. On offer are School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA) courses in:

General Level:

- Animal Production Systems (APS)
- Plant Production Systems (PPS)
- Physical Education Studies (PES)
- Mathematics
- English

ATAR Level:

- APS (Year 12 only 2024)
- PPS (Year 12 only 2024)
- Agricultural Science (Year 11 only in 2024) NEW replaces APS/PPS from 2024
- Agribusiness (Year 11 only in 2024) NEW
- Mathematics
- English

Current students will complete their APS/PPS studies in Year 12, 2024. All students entering Year 11, 2024, will be enrolled as the first cohort in the new courses.

Foundation:

- Mathematics
- English

Additionally, students are able to complete vocational courses, Work Experience and a wide range of short courses such as First Aid.



Vocational Education and Training

The WA College of Agriculture Narrogin is a Registered Training Organisation (RTO) which allows the College to train, assess and certify students in Nationally Recognised Qualifications. At present, the College can offer the following industry areas:

- Rural Production (Agriculture, Wool Handling)
- General Construction Pathway
- Engineering Pathway
- Automotive Vocational Pathway
- Furniture Making Pathway

Students who complete the requirements of each training area are issued with Nationally Recognised Qualifications which can articulate to apprenticeships and further training.

Credit Transfer

Units of Competency or qualifications gained from another RTO can contribute towards qualifications here if the qualification rules allow for it. Please see the Deputy Principal for further information.

Recognition of Prior Learning

If students have already acquired skills and knowledge from previous employment, courses and industry work experience, they can apply to have this recognized. Students need to speak to their instructor who will arrange a skills and knowledge assessment to determine competence.

During the two or three year program, students have the opportunity to complete the requirements of the following:

- Western Australian Certificate of Education
- Western Australian Statement of School Achievement (WASSA)
- Australian Tertiary Aggregate Rank (ATAR pathway only)

An Independent Public School





Year 10 at WA College of Agriculture Narrogin allows students to experience all aspects of an agricultural college education and link directly to Year 11 and 12 pathways. It is made up of a combination of Australian Curriculum and nationally accredited training units and aimed at providing a broad introduction to all learning areas at the college to enable Year 10s to make an informed choice when selecting Year 11/12 pathways. All year 10 students enrol in the same courses.

Over the course of the week, Year 10 students are involved in the following:

3 days per week: Class

Australian Curriculum courses

- English
- Maths
- Science
- Humanities and Social Sciences
- Health and Physical Education

1 day per week: Farm

Rostered to all farm sections and working towards AHC20122 Certificate II in Agriculture, ideally by the end of Year 11, with the option of progressing onto AHC30122 Certificate III in Agriculture in Year 12.

1 day per week: Trades

Introduction to and development of generic skills in each of the trades areas leading to selection of two areas in year 11 and completion of full qualifications by the end of year 12.

- Automotive (AUR20720 Certificate II in Automotive Vocational Preparation)
- Furniture Making (MSF20522 Certificate II in Furniture Making Pathways)
- Construction (CPC20220 Certificate II in Construction Pathways)
- Engineering (MEM20422 Certificate II in Engineering Pathways)

For 2024, Trades will be using *ReadCloud* (Third Party Agreement with *AEIT* RTO 121314) to assist with assessment through their Learning Management System

For every student there is a cross curricular numeracy and literacy support which connects knowledge and practice across Class, Farm and Trades. This additionally supports students towards gaining their OLNA and WACE by the end of Year 12.





Year 11/12 Pathways

Students in Years 11 and 12 select either a Foundation, General or the ATAR Pathway. Each pathway provides the same courses but at different levels. A counselling process is used to determine the pathway of best fit for each individual student.

Year 11/12 Foundation and General Pathways

The Foundation and General pathways are structured for those students who are seeking either direct employment or apprenticeship/traineeship training after leaving school.

Different literacy and numeracy needs are catered for by offering General and Foundation courses in English and Maths.

In additional to the class based learning leading to the WACE (Western Australian Certificate of Education), students in these pathways spend time on farm working towards Certificates II and/or III in Agriculture and two other certificates from the Trades area.

For every student there is a cross curricular numeracy and literacy support which connects knowledge and practice across Class, Farm and Trades. This additionally supports students towards gaining their OLNA and WACE by the end of Year 12.



Year 11/12 ATAR Pathway

The ATAR (Australian Tertiary Aggregate Rank) pathway is structured for those students with the academic ability to study at a higher level. Students in this pathway study four class based courses at ATAR level and at the end of Year 12 sit the external WACE exams and generate an ATAR score based on their school and external exam marks.

Depending on the ATAR score achieved, students can access a number of university courses including Agribusiness, Agriculture, Animal Science and Crops and Pasture Science at Curtin, Murdoch, UWA. Most universities offer alternate entry pathways for students who do not meet the required ATAR score. Parents/students are advised to investigate courses and entry requirements direct with universities.

University graduates with agriculture qualifications find themselves in high demand in a wide range of careers and occupations.

In addition to the class based learning leading to an ATAR score, students in this pathway spend time on farm working towards AHC20122 Certificate II in Agriculture and two other certificates from the Trades area with the option to study AHC30122 Certificate III in Agriculture.

Ties with industry are maintained by including a wide range of field trips and guest speakers. Students enjoy these activities as they assist them to understand how the agricultural industry fits together as a whole.

College Trips and Excursion

Trips and excursions are a significant part of the WA College of Agriculture Narrogin's program. They are important to build friendships, improve communication skills, offer valuable learning experiences and provide cultural awareness.

Educational Excursions and Camps

The College regularly takes students on camps and excursions as part of the educational programs.

Such excursions and camps include Wagin Woolorama, Dowerin and Newdegate Field Days, trips to industry locations around Western Australia, study tours of the southwest and visits to local farms.

Guest Speakers

Industry representatives, past students and the school nurse are a few of the many guest speakers that visit the College on a regular basis. The College aims to provide students with the most current and relevant information and this is best provided by those who specialize in an area.

Country Week

Each year the College takes a team of students to compete at Country Week (SHS) in the final week of Term 2. The remaining students attend a school based program.

Students train for their chosen sport at least once a week in Term 2 before spending the week competing against schools from across Western Australia.

Work Experience

All students have the opportunity to participate in Work Experience each year to gain valuable workplace skills and experience.



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Short Courses

The WA College of Agriculture Narrogin offers a number of short courses which complement the existing pathways on offer. Many of these courses are seen as compulsory as they represent important generic skills. Most of the short courses lead to a formal qualification or credential but some are more of a recreational nature. Some of the short courses have additional charges which are outlined in the "College Charges, Contributions and Personal Items List".

Residential

Residential staff at the WA College of Agriculture Narrogin provide pastoral care, support and guidance to ensure the welfare and social development of students under their care. Their role is closely aligned with parenting as they supervise meals, homework, duties and after hours activities.

The boarding facilities at WA College of Agriculture Narrogin consist of single air-conditioned rooms in blocks of 16 for approximately 138 boarders. Students are able to personalise their rooms to help them feel at home.

Wholesome meals are provided by the College kitchen for students often using eggs, meat and vegetables produced on the farm and prepared on site.

Sport forms an integral part of life at the WA College of Agriculture Narrogin. Students are encouraged to participate in a wide variety of sports and many represent the school at local, state and national levels. Students have the option of playing in hockey, football, basketball and netball competitions in Narrogin.

Our recreational facilities include weights area, gymnasium, tennis courts, football and sporting ovals, cricket practice wickets and riding arena. The Shugg Recreation room provides a space where students can watch movies, play pool and table tennis. A music room allows students with musical ability to practice and develop their skills.

The rural location of the College allows students to follow their passions after school hours. Students interested in horses can practice their skills in the arena. Farm duties continue after the school day and onto the weekend with students expected to share in the responsibility of caring for livestock and keeping the farm operating on weekends.

Residential supervisors arrange weekend activities to entertain and educate students. Shopping trips to Perth, bowling, Adventure World and ice skating are excursions to participate in. While at the College, evening barbeques, camp outs in the paddock and movie nights provide a relaxed atmosphere for students to unwind.

Optional and Short Courses

AHC 30122 CERTIFICATE III AGRICULTURE

Students who complete AHC20122 Certificate II in Agriculture have the option of working towards AHC30122 Certificate III in Agriculture. The Certificate III qualification is at a higher level and requires skills in planning, coordinating and organizing. Students electing Certificate III can expect higher level of and additional theory tasks as well as taking a leadership role in farm operations. To be eligible to enroll into this course, students need to have completed 90% of their Certificate II in Agriculture by the end of Year 11.

With permission, and reliant on their completion of the Certificate II, Year 12 students may also nominate to complete the AHC33116 in Advanced Wool Handling under a Third Party Agreement with South Regional TAFE (RTO 52790)



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Fees and Charges

Fees and Charges to attend the WA College of Agriculture Narrogin are broken into a number of types depending on the circumstances of the student:

- Residential boarding fees \$9330.00 (2024) (paid over three installments)
- Day students \$700
- Year 10 course charges and contributions \$235 plus charges for optional activities
- Year 11/12 course charges \$500 \$800 depending on course chosen plus charges for optional activities
- Additional charges for voluntary trips and excursions, trades personal projects

Note: these fees and charges are reviewed each year.

Assistance with fees

Payment plans are available to assist parents to pay fees. Assistance for Isolated Children– up to \$12091.00 per year made up of 2 parts; \$9396.00 basic and \$2695.00 additional, subject to parental income and actual boarding costs. (2023) State Boarding Away from Home Allowance- \$1350.00 (2023)

Student Services Support for Health and Wellbeing

The Student Services team is a group of staff who work to maximise the educational and social-emotional outcomes of students at the College. Student Services consists of a diverse team from across the College who work collaboratively with students, their parents/caregivers, and staff across Farm, Trades, Class and the Residential.

We off the following wraparound services:

Support for wellbeing, mental and physical health:

- Triaging students at education risk (SAER) to optimise support over all areas of the College and referral to external supports as required.
- Liaising with external health-care providers including CAMHS, GPs, Narrogin Regional Hospital, DCPFS, SDERA and Holyoake.
- Accommodating a school nurse who attends the College fortnightly. Students can consult the nurse and all
 appointments are confidential. Parents/caregivers can request appointments directly with the nurse or through the
 Student Services Coordinator.
- Accommodating a school psychologist who attends the College on set days. Parents/caregivers may request appointments through the Student Services Coordinator if they have concerns about wellbeing or learning.
- Ensuring that key staff are Youth Mental Health First Aid and Gatekeeper trained as required to support students and identify risks as required.
- Working with the Health and Physical Education teacher to support the delivered SCSA curriculum and programs such as Keys4Life.
- Liaising with Farm, Class and Trades teachers and trainers to ensure that the *Standing Together Against Violence* (*DoE 2023*) are followed through a whole college approach.
- Delivering relevant and timely whole college Professional Learning around issues associated with health and wellbeing to staff from the Residential, Trades, Farm, Class and College support personnel.
- Continuing to develop staff awareness of, and imbue trauma-informed practice in, Student Services and Whole School initiatives such as best practice behaviour management.
- Providing support to students, staff and parents/caregivers during critical incidents.

Support for social and emotional engagement:

- Providing access for students to the school Chaplain when they are present in school, during the day, or by appointment at recess and lunchtime. Parents/caregivers can request appointments directly with the chaplain or through the Student Services Coordinator.
- Providing access for students to the Student Support Officer when they are present in school, during the day, by
 appointment or at recess and lunchtime. Parents/caregivers can request appointments directly with the chaplain or
 through the Student Services Coordinator.
- Liaising with the L3 Coordinator for Leadership, Innovation and Industry to provide meaningful and engaging incursions, excursions and fun activities for all students during the school year.
- Liaising with Farm, Class and Trades teachers and trainers to ensure that the College's *Behaviour Support Policy* (2024) and *Good Standing Policy* (2024) is followed through a whole college approach.

Support for Learning and Engagement:

- Identifying students, on entry, who require documented plans and apply the College's Documented Plan Policy (2024).
- Developing and implementing those documented plans in conjunction with teachers and trainers from Class, Farm and Trades.
- Recommending OLNA accommodations to the Deputy Principal.
- Leading and supporting case conferencing to ensure Risk Management Planning, Safety Planning and Care Planning is thorough, current, and allows students to engage fully with their education.
- Liaising with the Deputy Principal and L3 Coordinator for Leadership, Innovation and Industry in careers planning for students through Years 10 – 12.
- Supporting the dissemination of Whole School Literacy and Numeracy teaching and learning frameworks.
- Providing small group OLNA practice classes in conjunction with the Class teachers, to support Literacy, Language and Numeracy in Trades and Farm.
- Monitoring attendance from a pastoral care perspective, including creating Reduced or Individual Attendance Plans.
- Where students are in breach of college policies, facilitating restorative pathways to re-engage with the college
